
Addendum to Blackburn and Bos' Gothenburg slides

QUESTION 2: Draw the DRS(s) corresponding to the following sentences and explain why the pronoun can or cannot refer back to the intended antecedent. (Partly based on Malaga2.ppt, slides 25-32.)

- (1) Vincent danced with a woman₁. \checkmark She₁ was pretty.
- (2) Vincent danced with no woman₁. * She₁ was pretty.
- (3) Vincent did not dance with a woman₁. ___ She₁ was pretty.
- (4) Vincent did not dance with the woman₁. \checkmark She₁ was pretty.
- (5) Vincent did not dance with Mia₁. \checkmark She₁ was pretty.
- (6) \checkmark If a student₁ is-good-at-logic, he₁ does-well-in-semantics.
- (7) \checkmark Every student that bought a cat₁ took it₁ to Dr. M.
